MARCHing ON

SHOW RESULTS

The March RECC meeting started off with a summary of the recent coin show, which was a huge success. We had 853 attendees for the two day show, just a little less than last year. We had 48 paying dealers, and income from that was a bit better than last year.

The biggest question going into the show was the cost for the gold coins in the Gold Coin Drawing. They cost \$3200 to purchase. Thanks to the efforts of 47 club members selling tickets, and a little to sales during the show, we more than covered the cost.

Of those who sold tickets for the gold drawing, the # 3 seller was Jon Maria M with 202 tickets, who won a 2-1/2 peso Mexican gold piece. The #2 seller was Lee G, with 600 tickets. And the #1 seller again this year was Curtis S, who sold 1275 tickets! For that effort (along with his wife) he won a \$2-1/2 Liberty gold piece, and she won a California fractional gold piece in jewelry. And among all the other ticket sellers, a name was drawn for a 4th prize. The winner was Bob A, who was glad to be back after missing the last month due to illness— welcome back!

The door prize drawing was held at the meeting as well, going to club member Angelo Catelani.

Overall the show made a profit, which will be kept in a special account for covering *next* year's show.

SHOW FINDS

- Mike M was looking for a 1958 Proof Set. He couldn't find one, but did get a 1959 set.
- Phil A got a 2006 3 coin American Eagle set

- ◆ Edwin H filled in the last holes in his Type set!
- Martha V said there were a lot of Buffalo nickels to look at, and found four for her collection.
- ◆ Joseph M mentioned that Walt Ostremecki is running for the Vice President of the ANA and encouraged us to vote for him. Joe was looking for centennial Canadian bills, but did not find any. He did find some Canadian municipal trade tokens, and brought in a large album full of them. They are made of various metals.
- ◆ Dan M brought in a silver 1974 St. Patrick's Commemorative, celebrating the 'destruction of pagan idol'.
- Sean M was disappointed with the few woods available at the show. But he did get some good new ideas for collecting.
- ◆ Jon Maria bought the new U.S. Army Commemorative
- ♠ Rich W did not find the 1895-O Barber dime, and will keep looking. He did by a Max stapler. It staples 2X2s with the back side of the staple being flat. This prevents the raised staple from scratching the coin next to it. A good investment for \$12
 - ♦ Charley B tried to save money by coming to the show on Sunday. He did, since it was on Friday and Saturday. He did talk about women and men on U.S. coins.
 - ♦ Glenn mentioned some major historical women over the centuries, explaining that was why so many women were initially on the U.S coins (in the form of Lady Liberty).



- ♦ Kurt put an ad in Numismatic news to sell an item. He received an interesting letter back, offering to sell a number of rare slabbed Morgan dollars valued around \$12,000, for only \$250, but only with a mail order and only if certain instructions were followed. Being a Private Investigator, he looked up the address and found out it was a prison! If it sounds too good to be true......
- ◆ Larry M had a good show as a dealer. His best find was a book on errors and rarities recommended by Jim C. He was amazed at the value of some of the errors he had purchased long ago.
- Willie's favorite purchase was a 1960-D Lincoln cent, a large D with a small D overstrike
- Merle had purchased an 1875 20cent piece before the show, which had been painted silver and lacquered. Being unable to remove the layers, he was able to sell it to a dealer at the show and trade for a 1875 20cent piece in VG condition.

A.N.A. SHOW

The A.N.A. National Money Show was held in Sacramento on March 17-19. The official program stated there were over 550 dealers from around the country, though some shared tables. On Friday March 18 there were at least a dozen RECC members at the show, and all seemed happy with the selection. I think we all also came away with something for our collections.

Besides all the dealers there for our retail therapy, the ANA had a very nice section with several items displayed. There was an 1804 dollar, a 1913 Liberty Head nickel, and a Brasher Doubloon. There was a good sized display on the California gold rush, including a 100 ounce gold nugget found in 2010 here in California— with a metal detector! It had ~\$120,000 in gold bullion value, but sold for \$400,000 at a Heritage auction. One other display had autographs of *every* United States President from Washington to Carter, along with vintage coins that circulated during their administrations.
