### MILITARY, VETERANS, AND WAR

In honor of "D" Day and Flag Day, this months topic was about numismatic items related to the Military, Veterans, and War.

Angelo C brought in 2 examples of Occupation currency from Italy. He lived in Italy during WW2, and recalls being shot at from both sides (American and German). He brought in the 10 and 50 Lira occupation bills he saved from then, and also has 1 and 5 Lira specimens.

Steven H brought in his father's Short Snorters, which were bills signed by members of the same military group. His were on 1935 Silver Certificates, but he also had some from some of the countries his father flew to. In theory, when you went to a bar, if you had your short snorter on you somebody else would have to buy the drinks.



Phil A talked about a Civil War related coin, the 50 cent Commemorative of the 75th Anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg.



Curtis S had some copies of confederate currency (though one may have been real). He also had various denominations of German Deutschmarks from 1944 Germany. And he had a German Lugar pistol, obtained from a friend who was a WW 2 paratrooper—obtained from a fallen German officer. Every part on the pistol had the same serial number. Finally, he had the cap from one of the WW2 WAVES (Women Accepted for Voluntary Emergency Service, the women who served in the Navy in official but non-combat roles).

All the medals on it tell a story. Curtis loves the history behind all his collecting interests.

Andy S likes the Eisenhower Bicentennial Commemorative





Rich W talked about the Morgan Dollar. Have you ever looked at the headdress closely on Lady Liberty? It features wheat, cotton balls and cotton flower, symbols of the two factions from the Civil War getting together again. He also talked a bit more about fractional currency. They were the suggestion of U.S. Secretary of the Treasury Salmon P. Chase. Since most of the public in the Civil War was hoarding copper, silver, and gold, he proposed using postage stamps of some type as currency. This postal currency resembled postage stamps and was easy to counterfeit. Later Chase requested Fractional Currency in more colorful notes with printing on the reverse which were harder to counterfeit. The North raised a total of \$368 million with the notes to fund the Civil War! Rich has ~15-20 of these notes.



Frank V brought in ~ 40 Confederate bills and also ~ 40 fractional notes along with some Civil War Tokens— quite an impressive bunch. And all for sale.



Charlie C talked about War and Brotherly Love. The talk stemmed from an article in the Numismatist (which all of you would get if you joined the ANA to support our hobby, hint hint). Since the ANA Convention is in Philadelphia (City of Brotherly Love), the article talked about early English coins, which is one of my favorite collections. William of Normandy crossed the English Channel in 1066, and managed to conquer all of England. Two of the most powerful rulers at the time were brothers, but rather than join to battle William they were too busy fighting each other. William was so confident that he even brought an accountant with him from France. He was a big burly man and a rather cruel leader. After ruling about 21 years, he died 2 weeks after blunt trauma ruptured his intestines; his bloated body exploded when soldiers tried to stuff him into too small a casket. The penny pictured is the first of four types issued.



William had 3 sons. The oldest, Robert, was too rebellious for anyone to handle, so he was kept in Normandy, France. The next oldest son William II, inherited the throne. He was even more cruel than his father. He was shot in the back and died while hunting in the Royal Forest, and his younger brother Henry was promptly crowned King. Yes, it did seem suspicious at the time. So much for brotherly love. Henry was the first of 8 Henrys, and he ruled for 35 years. The coin below is from William II.
