GOLD SHOW & TELL

- ◆ Phil A talked about a modern commemorative \$10 gold, the 2003 First Flight Coin. It features the Wright Brothers on one side, their plane the Kitty Hawk on the reverse. Most commemorative gold is in \$5 denomination, like the Jamestown, Granite Lady, and Civil War coins.



- ♦ Jon Maria M talked about a commemorative of 30 years of gold Panda coins—in silver.



- ♦ Jim C brought in some gold ingots from the Nevada City Mint. It was commissioned to do ten ingots from the Lucky Chance Mining Company in 16:1 gold. They had serial numbers from 1 to 10, and enough left over for an 11th. Jim bought the first (#1), the last (#10), and the extra (# 11 of 10).



- ♦ Willie Q has a gold coin in his safe, and is glad it is still his.
- ♦ Curtis S talked about his prize for being the top Gold Coin drawing ticket seller last year. It is a PCGS AU 1852 \$2-1/2 gold coin. It could have been yours if you were the top seller, and maybe one like it will be given away for the top seller of our 2013 coin show.
- ♦ Gary C inherited a bag of coins from his English grandfather. One was a miniature gold sovereign, with Queen Victoria on the obverse and St. George and the Dragon on the reverse
- ♦ Glenn C is buying modern gold plated replicas of early American coins from the "American Mint".
- ♦ Lee G brought in one of his favorite gold coins. It is an 1851 \$50 California gold "slug" from Augustus Humbert, the assayer for the U.S. Mint. His training as a watchmaker in New York is reflected in the fine scrollwork on the reverse. These were called "slugs", or "five piece", though the official term was "ingot". Lee scraped up the money to buy this long ago, and is so glad he did. Not only has it gone up tremendously in value, but it is an important piece of history. His variety was the 0.877 fine gold; there were a few others.

ONE MORE OCTAGON

This is an octagonal coin I do have, one that was handed down to my father and then to me from somewhere back in the family. There was a scarcity of small coins during the California Gold Rush. Starting in 1852, quarter, half, and dollar coins— both round and octagonal— were struck by private mints from native gold. They were not well accepted as being underweight and hard to handle—the quarter dollar was about 1/4" in size for instance. But they became popular as souvenirs. About 35,000 total pieces are estimated to have been made, with more than 570 known varieties. Beware of abundant modern counterfeits, which often have a bear on the reverse.
