SHOW AND TELL

My apologies for this being an abbreviated list of the Show and Tell talks, since I had to step outside for an important phone call and missed many of the talks. Those at the meeting were treated to a lot of interesting items. These are ones I did catch:

 Glenn M talked about a 1783 Spanish milled dollar from the shipwreck of the El Cazador ("The Hunter"). It was a ship laden with 450,000 silver reale coins sent from Vera Cruz,



Mexico to bring much needed hard currency to the Spanish colony of Louisiana. Heading for New Orleans, it was never heard from. In August 1993, the trawler *Mistake* snagged its net on something, and when hauled aboard it revealed a pile of silver coins— from the lost



wreck of the Cazador.

- ◆ Lucky Larry M added his thoughts about the CAC coin stickers. For dealers, he feels if is something that makes coins more attractive to potential customers. Slabbed coins already have designations like "proof-like" and "+". Larry had a "+" coin with a CAC sticker. Does that make it a "++", or 3/4 higher grade?
- Guy S has collected Canadian and Mexican coins, as well as the big 5 Kopek Russian coins. He got his first at an RECC show many






 George W told a story about a friend who found a 1916-D Winged Liberty ("Mercury") dime in change, and eventually sold it to buy a guitar.

Merle proudly displayed his complete set of proof 3 cent silver coins. This also included all the varieties in the series, which ran from 1858 to 1873. The highest mintage of any of these dates was But while the number of proof coins minted is listed, whatever ones went unsold each year were melted. Thus the actual populations are actually less. And while they are certainly not cheap, they are far less expensive than other coins denominations of higher mintage because the demand is far less for this series. It was fun looking at auction archives of proof 3 cent silver coins (like the ones I found below), as they varied from bright white to dark, and various hues of the rainbow. Merle really had a fantastic set-hopefully many of you had a chance to view them.
