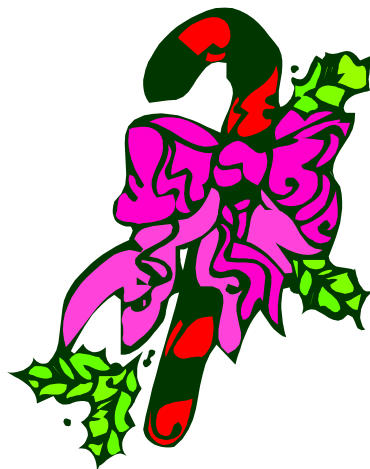

GIVING THANKS

The Thanksgiving meeting of the RECC was crowded with hungry members and guests (at least 72 of you). And I'll keep to the facts with the rest of the newsletter.

- Merle had a wrap-up of the October benefit auction, which generated \$430 for the club. Kudos to Andy for keeping the auction running smoothly!
- Plans for the coin show are going well. We have already sold 16 of the 66 tables, and many more will be sold soon. Please remember to keep selling the Gold Coin Drawing tickets. See Merle if you need more.
- It is time to pay your Membership Dues. Please pay Mike at the meeting (or you can mail it to the club). Don't forget that there is a Life Membership option— perhaps a holiday present? We have 86 Life Members so far!
- Nomination of officers and elections will take place at the December meeting. Any adult member is welcome to run for the position of President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary.
- We will have a Flea Market at the December meeting, from 6-7PM. Tables will be available for buying/selling/trading numismatic items.
- December will be Dessert Night! Everyone is encouraged to bring a dessert to share with the club. It is usually one of the best attended meetings, because Santa Merle will probably stop by as well with numismatic presents for all good members and junior members.



WALKING LIBERTY

You guessed it— the U.S. Mint came out with the Walking Liberty Centennial Gold Coin on November 17. It is 1/2 ounce of 24-karat gold, and is the third and final of the centennial gold coins minted this year, with a maximum mintage limit of 70,000 coins.

It is a very nice replica (but in gold!) of the 1916 Liberty Walking Half Dollar. As I mentioned in last month's newsletters, design requests went out for something new in the dime, quarter and half dollar for 1916. Adolph Alexander Weinman was the chosen designer (along with his Mercury Dime design), and his initials are seen below the date on 1916-1917 issues, and on the lower left reverse corner from 1917 until the series ended in 1947. And as usual, mint master Charles Barber was hostile to the design replacing his own outdated designs.

It also had a design fifty years ahead of its time: Ms. Liberty is wearing the American flag, a rebellious counterculture fad of the 1960s. She is walking eastward (toward war-torn Europe), looking upward at something unknown. In the crook of her left arm is a large bundle of oak and laurel branches, said to be for military and civilian honors. And on her feet are cross-thonged sandals.

On the reverse, a gnarled tree under the eagle's right talons was said (by a mint report) to be a sapling of a Mountain Pine, symbolic of America. Which is interesting, since it is not exclusively an American species.

There were an estimated seven revisions of the original design, though few patterns remain and those initial dies were mostly destroyed. Even though the design had great artistic merits, it was technically difficult to produce a high quality relief on both sides because the high relief on the obverse opposed high relief areas on the reverse (making it difficult to bring up the design details on both sides). So it can be hard to find coins with full hand details, for instance. There were a couple attempts to correct this, which failed. Nevertheless, it is still a beautiful and sought-after coin. And the obverse design lives on today in the American Eagle Silver bullion coins, with clearer detail.



It is easier to see from this enlargement that Liberty's left hand detail is mostly missing. If anyone has a full hand coin, please bring it in to show. You can also see better detail of the flag draped around her shoulders and of the two types of branches she is holding.
