#### STANDING LIBERTY

A number of you have come to the meetings to show off your Mercury Dime 2016 Centennial gold coin. The U.S. Mint did a very nice job reproducing the details of that dime. Now I just gotta go get one for myself. Though the mint has sold out, they are available on the secondary market.

Now the mint has the Standing Liberty Quarter 2016 Centennial gold coin, which was (and still is) available from the mint I did get one and it is also a hor

from the mint. I did get one, and it is also a beautifully minted coin. So it seems like a good time to review the original.

The Act of Sept. 26, 1890 stated that any coin design could be changed only after 25 years' tenure. The Barber quarter's 25 years was to end in 1917. So in December 1915 the U.S. Treasury held a competition for new designs of the dime, quarter, and half dollar (apparently forgetting the dreary results of the 1891 contest with all 3 coins having the same Barber design).

The winning design was by Hermon Atkins MacNeil. He was to visit the engraving department of the mint to confer with the chief mint engraver about mechanical requirements for the coin. The chief, Charles Barber (who designed the Barber quarters), was completely uncooperative as he tended to be. So an almost forgotten Assistant engraver helped: George Morgan (of Morgan Dollar fame). Prototypes were made, only missing the original plan for two dolphins at Liberty's feet and a religious motto on the drapery Across her arm.

Jumping the gun by several weeks, 52,000 quarters with the new design were minted in the last 2 weeks of December with the 1916 date. The public was not notified, and they were released with 1917 dated coins at the beginning of the year.

There were a couple design flaws with the original coin: the date until 1925 was on an exposed plaque unprotected by a raised rim, so it tended to wear out quickly; and the head was prone to show less than half the normal detail. Full head specimens carry a premium price.

Ornithologists claimed that the eagle had "the head of a hawk, the wings of an eagle, the body of a dove".

And one cherished final feature of MacNeil's 1916 obverse necessitated a modification by Charles Barber. Ms. Liberty's right breast was exposed, showing a nipple (and on the sharpest strikes a realistic areola). Political pressure from followers of Anthony Comstock and his Society for the Suppression of Vice succeeded in a change to a Type II obverse with Ms. Liberty's bust covered in chain mail (though her right leg was still bare to mid-thigh).

On the obverse design, Liberty's left arm is raised uncovering a shield in the attitude of protection. Her right hand holds an olive branch of peace. She is standing in the opening of a wall containing thirteen stars.

There is one major rarity in the series, the 1918/7 S. During the fall of 1917 there was a rush to fill coinage quotas, and the Engraving Department was making 1917 and 1918 dies at the same time. One working die received a blow from a 1917 hub, then went to an annealing furnace to be prepared for a normal second blow. It was mistakenly sent to the wrong press and received a blow from a 1918 hub. Inspection failed to spot the error, and the die (mint marked for San Francisco) was used briefly.

This is a Type 2 Standing Liberty Quarter, with several modifications from the original Mac-Neil design of Type 1. You can compare it with the prior photo, and see the changes: The base is recessed so the date won't wear out so fast; her bust is covered with chain mail; the olive branch and drapery on her right arm are more crude and ill defined; the details on the wall are less distinct; even the hairstyle is less flowing. It still is a beautiful coin.
