SHOW AND TELL

- Gary C started off with sad news that he is changing jobs, moving to New Mexico. He is looking up coin clubs anywhere near the relatively small town where he will be working. Two months ago he was reading a Coin World article on currency with funny serial numbers, and he has a couple good ones. One is a "radar" note with the # 61111116, and the other is a "repeater" with the # L03030303H
- Steven H is a metal detector, among other things. He was given permission to search a property in Healdsburg, where an old ruined barn was. After moving some old rotten boards away, he was able to detect an old MJB coffee can. Stuffed inside the can, wrapped in 1940s newspaper, were 23

● Guy S is near to completing his collection of the large Russian 5 Kopek coins, having ~153 or so of the 160 dates and mints. Last month he bought a rare 1788 coin from the TM mint in the Crimea (it only operated for 2 years)



- Jim C is interested in (among other things) paper test strikes, showing two very interesting ones. First were paper shim strikes, where shim paper is used to test the dies striking coins and make sure they are centered properly. The other was a Bank of Mexico currency color test strike.
- Merle A admitted that he is addicted to coins. After completing (or nearly so) some type sets, he has now decided to collect coins all minted 100 years before his birth, in 1856. He brought in a box of the ones he has obtained so far, including several 1856 half cents in MS condition (forming a nice grading set), plus one cent, quarter dollar,

and perhaps his favorite— the 1856 Flying Eagle cent. That is a coin he had dreamed of for a long time and finally bought one in the last year.



• Randon S talked about his daughter being a big Harry Potter fan. He brought in her type set of coins from the series. Author JK Rowling, in a spoof of the quirky old British system of pounds/ shillings/pence, devised the golden Galleon, which is worth 17 silver Sickles, and worth 493 brass Knutes.



Charlie C had two things to show. First was the latest addition to his scale weight collection. Scale weights have been used for thousands of years, prior to coins being used, for standardizing units of weight. Scales were used for weighing precious metals like silver, and later (when coins were finally being minted) for verifying the amount of the metal in coins. This weight was from the

Roman province of Bithynia during the reign of Septimius Severus (reigned 193-211 AD). It is a half libra weight, with one libra (equivalent to a pound) being the standard weight, divided into 12 uncias (ounces). This octagonal weight has 11 lines of Greek inscriptions on each side (3" across), which still need to be fully translated.

The other thing he talked about was a recent trip to Berlin, Germany, which has fantastic museums. Rather than go on a group tour of an art museum, he went to the Bode Museum. It houses one of the best and largest coin collections in the world, with over 300,00 coins as well as numismatic books. Only a fraction are displayed in the four galleries, but they were among the finest known specimens. There were 100 themed panels of coins, including ancients, medals, forgeries, and extensive European types sets. The US



type set was very nice, with the pristine 1795 dollar being a standout. A book from the museum was brought to the meeting— but it was in German. Still, the photos gave a great overview of the collection.


