VETERANS DAY

With all that was going on during the meeting, we forgot to mention Veteran's Day, which was 2 days prior to the meeting. Many of you have served in the Military, and we are all grateful. Thanks for your service! The following is an item forwarded to me by Joe M (from the Cincinnati Numismatic Association):

The meaning of coins left on soldiers' graves: Coins left on tombstones have meaning beyond remembrance. It can be a sign of respect to those who lost their life serving in the military. It shows that their life had value and is something worthy of commemoration.

During the Viet Nam War era it became common to leave coins for fallen friends for beer and poker games in the next life. There is no standard tradition though, so it varies over the years as to what different denominations symbolized.

Roughly, this curious custom at military graves is as follows:

- o A penny means you knew the deceased or just visited to pay respects
- o A nickel means you went to boot camp together
- A dime means you served together
- A quarter at the grave lets the family know you were with the fallen soldier when he/she died.
- Challenge coins that identify with specific units or accomplishments are also sometimes left on the headstones of fellow comrades.

What happens to the coins left on the top of gravestones? At Arlington National Cemetery, coins left at President John F. Kennedy's Memorial and others are collected as donations for cemetery upkeep.

It is nice to reflect on that last item and consider what Thanksgiving is all about.
