GOLD!

The September RECC meeting was a busy one. Merle started by reminding us of our upcoming coin show on <u>February15-16, 2019</u> in Finley hall of the Sonoma County Fairgrounds. More info will be coming about Gold Coin Drawing tickets and other preparations.

Something new coming to Santa Rosa on **March 22-24, 2019** is the Western States Token Society's ("WESTS") annual Token Jamboree. It had been in Jackson, California in prior years, but Merle persuaded them to come here when a new location was needed. There are plans for twenty four dealers from around the country, including the top two dealer/collectors. It promises to have some amazing tokens and very knowledgeable dealers to meet all your token collecting needs.

The **October** meeting should be really fun. We will have our annual **OKOBERFEST DINNER** meeting, with wieners and some side dishes (sauerkraut, potato salad) arranged by Mike M and Deanna & Helmut J. If you can, *please bring a salad/side dish or a dessert to share* as well, so that there will be plenty of food. In addition, we will have our **19**th **Annual Helen and Roy Roberts Benefit Auction!** Bring in and *donate a numismatic item to the auction, and the dinner will be free!* Otherwise, dinner is \$5. Proceeds for from the auction help support the club. With rising rent and mailing costs, it really does make a difference. Last year's auction was cancelled along with the October meeting due to the Santa Rosa fires, so it will be nice to resume this tradition. There will not be a regular auction at the end of the meeting.

We had a couple special guests at the September meeting. Lloyd Chan, the President of the Northern California Numismatic Association, was present and introduced Scott and Debby Douglas from Ontario Canada. Scott is the president of the Ontario (Canada) Numismatic Society, and he will be one of the presenters of the upcoming California Numismatic Seminar in Vallejo on September 15. His topic will be 'Hudson Bay Tokens and Numismatics'. Interestingly, when growing up in Canada, the history he mostly learned was about George Washington, Abe Lincoln, etc.—and not about important Canadian events. The Hudson's Bay Company was one of the earliest companies in Canada's history and was very important economically. His talk should be

excellent, as will be the others that are scheduled.

At the December 2017 meeting we 'presented' David Avila with the Willie Quarante Memorial Award for outstanding service. One exceptional club member is chosen to be honored yearly for all he or she does for the club. The plaques for the award had been completed well in advance: one for the club has each yearly winner listed; the other was for David. Unfortunately, they burned up in the October Santa Rosa fire. But fortunately, D&S Awards replaced the club plaque free of charge (they were very generous to the community after the fire). They made up a new plaque for David, which was awarded at the meeting-finally! Congratulations David, we appreciate all your work.

FAVORITE GOLD COIN

 Bill G brought in his second favorite gold coin. His favorite is an 1853 gold \$1 that he got from his father. He brought in an 1853 California fractional gold 50 cent piece, PCGS MS-61. Because of a scarcity of small coins during the California gold rush, quarter, half, and dollar coins were privately minted from native gold starting 1852. They were not too well accepted due to their small size and became more popular as souvenirs. Early coins contained up to



85% face value in gold, but that soon decreased. The Coinage Act of 1864 made private coinage illegal, but the law was not fully enforced until 1883. From 1872 to 1883 there were coins with dates and undated tokens produced. And to circumvent the law, some pieces made after 1881 were even backdated to the 1850s and 1860s. Early issues had Liberty heads, and later issues had Indian heads- with over 570

know varieties!

 Stephen K brought in a belt buckle given to him by his father, which had a 1906 Liberty \$10 gold piece in it.

Guy S has a few gold coins in his collection from various places. He brought in a gold solidus of Valens. He was the Eastern Roman Emperor from 364-378. His Brother Valentinian gave him the eastern half of the empire after accession to the

Roman Empire throne. Valens died in battle, which marked the beginning of the collapse of the Western Roman Empire as well.

Phil A brought in a beautiful Mexican 1918 20-peso gold piece. The obverse featured the classical eagle with a snake in its mouth, and the reverse showed the Aztec calendar.

 Larry C, King of the Diablo Numismatic Society (shown here on his throne), brought in a graded gold nugget. Nuggets are not usually encapsulated, but this one was - to confirm where it came from.

 Andy talked about his recent purchase, an 1895 Liberty Head \$5 coin. He was recently in the Lake Tahoe area, and went to Carson City where a visit to the mint inspired him with the fabulous collection of CC Mint coins.









• Bill C brought in a 1912 Canadian \$5 gold piece his grandmother won at age 17 for "elocution" prior to graduation

from high school. She was born in 1904. He talked about the Ottawa mint and brought a Canadian coin catalog. 1912 was the first year the Canadian mint produced gold coins, and they were completely Canadian- starting with gold mined in the Klondike. It featured King George V on the obverse, and the Canadian coat of arms used since 1868 (until the current official coat of arms adopted in 1921).

 Amber talked about her only gold coin: a 1/10 ounce gold Oregon Trail commemorative, which her mom won. Her great grandmother came across on the Oregon Trail.

 Rick S talked about his favorite gold coins, a set of fractional gold Buffalo nickel coins he bought from the mint for \$2200, and then turned around and sold it for \$6200! Charlie C brought in two favorite gold coins, an 1873 California gold quarter dollar, and an 1868 California gold dollar. As described earlier, these are really tiny coins- so their unpopularity is understandable. These didn't cost anything—they belonged to his grandfather, received in change.



Finally, Merle brought in a type set of Love Tokens. Most of them were made of dimes: in the late 1800s, for the cost of a dime, a second dime would be smoothed on one side and initials or a design engraved on it. But smaller and occasionally larger denominations would also be used. Gold coins were very valuable, and gold love tokens are rarely seen. Merle's pride is a \$20 gold piece which has been inscribed with a monogram on one side. This was practically a fortune for most people at the time it was produced, so the original owner was most likely a very wealthy person.
