A GOOFY MEETING- OOPS!


And now for something a little different. The RECC had a brand new topic for it's May meeting: Error Coins and Currency. As usual, there was a little business to get things started.....

Mike M handed out Red Books to those who ordered them. For some reason the Mega Red Books were not yet available, but they should be available at the June meeting.

The topic for the June meeting will be: MY FAVORITE OBSOLETE COIN OR CURRENCY. By obsolete, Merle says it is anything that is no longer made. Bring something in and talk about it, or just talk about your favorite even if you don't have it and get four free raffle tickets!

Mike M was talking with Merle about an autobiography that one of our coin club members wrote. It had a title in Italian that translated to "In the Mouth of the Wolf"—by Angelo Catelani. It detailed his experiences in World War II and was very interesting. In honor of Angelo and his service, we have given him an Honorable Life Membership, #98!

We also have two more new Life Members: Deanna J (LM-99) and Helmut J (LM-100) got the numbers they wanted. Now we have Life Member #101 available to the next person who wants to join that select group.



ERORRS

The show & tell started off with a slide show presentation by Charlie C on "Ancient Errors and Oddities". The talk was dedicated to Lee Gong. Besides having a fabulous collection, Lee was extremely knowledgeable in the minting process and about how modern errors occurred. The slide show began with some information on the *ancient* minting process, starting with making planchets. Pictured here are ancient molds for producing bronze planchets, with two different denomination blank planchets. The



diagram on the left shows how each coin was struck. Imagine after hammering away for hours on end- your arms would likely get tired and some errors would occur. Because the reverse (top) die was held by hand, it was frequently off center.

Double strikes were fairly common in ancient times. Imagine if the initial strike was significantly off center: the minter could simply strike the planchet again. One very rare ancient error is seen here. The initial strike completely missed the planchet, which was struck with the hammer. The corner of the obverse image still shows. The planchet was simply flipped over and both dies were aligned for the second strike. Ironically Larry C brought a modern version of a rare "flip-over double strike" dime also shown here.

Another kind of ancient error is called a brockage. This is where a planchet sticks to one of the dies after being struck. The next time that die is used, the stuck planchet acts as the die to produce a mirror image. Pictured here is a "Widow's Mite" coin with an anchor on the obverse and a star on the reverse, with both an obverse brockage and a reverse brockage.

In ancient times, it was sometimes easier or more economical to strike new coins over old ones, rather than having to manufacture new planchets. While technically not an error, if the strike was not hard enough it would allow us to see what was on the "undertype". This dime-sized coin was struck over a Roman denarius of Emperor Trajan- and you can see him peeking out of the bunch of grapes.

Finally, countermarks were used in ancient times to revalue coins, to confirm their worth (for instance when they were taken to a different country and used for trade), or for propaganda. The coins here bear the stamps of the 10th Roman Legion. LXF= Legio (Legion) X (ten) Fretensus (a battle won by the legion). The symbols of the legion were the galley (ship), a running boar, and a dolphin.

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
Guy S brought an off-center coin from ~ 200 BC Pontos. The obverse portrait is in the lower left corner; the reverse features a standing Nike

o Bill G brought in a 1906 Liberty Head Nickel (his favorite!) graded PCGS AU 58 with a planchet lamination error on the obverse.

Jim C brought in several currency errors. He also showed this Lincoln cent brockage to the right, and a very rare split coin (a shield nickel); it was split in the mint bag- and



very rarely are both halves seen











Andy S had a lot of fun showing off some fantastic currency errors. Some were in plain plastic holders. Others were 'slabbed', which was nice because a precise description of each error was included. These first two are shown both obverse and reverse. The first one had some of obverse printing done on the reverse side. The next one had *no* printing on the reverse side!





Finally, Larry C brought in some wonderful slabbed error coins. His flip-over double strike was shown earlier. Here are others:



A 1970-S double struck Jefferson Nickel and a 2000 cent double struck reverse capped die.
