DOLLARS AND SENSE

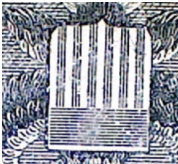
Since there wasn't anything discussed during the meeting, this is a good time to take up some newsletter space with a bit of research. This comes courtesy of an article about the one dollar bill, entitled "Who Was Hayim Solomon", provided by Willie Q. Some of this may be familiar, with a few interesting twists.

George Washington's financial advisor and assistant was a Jewish man named Hayim

Solomon. When American soldiers were freezing and running out of food during the cold winter of Valley Forge, it was Hayim who marshaled the Jews of America to provide relief aid for those stranded troops. He reportedly gave \$300,000, a huge sum at the time (and he died penniless). Without this help the young American Army likely would have been defeated by the British.

And here is where some of the article is likely inaccurate. Look at the back of the one dollar bill, which depicts the Great Seal of the United States of America. The stars above the eagle are in the shape of a six-point Star of David. And look at the shield on the eagle (turned upside down)- it looks like a menorah. The story goes that George Washington insisted on their representation so we should never forget

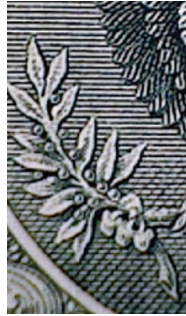
the Jewish people and what they have done in the interest of America. But the Great Seal was commissioned in 1776, and completed in 1782 while Washington was busy fighting the war. And he did not become president until 7 years later. Charles Thomsen, who designed the seal, made comments on all the symbolism and did not say anything about these two symbols being related that way. But it is an interesting coincidence and can still serve as a reminder. See the next page for more symbolism.



The pyramid on the left side of the bill is dark on the western side. It has been interpreted to mean the country was beginning and we had not explored the west, though this has not been documented either. It was intentionally left unfinished, meaning the country still had yet to finish growing. The pyramid symbol itself stood for "strength and duration".



The eye above the pyramid is the all-seeing eye, an ancient symbol of divinity. Ben Franklin, on one of three successive committees to help create the seal, wanted a symbol to reflect divine providence. His committee's design suggestion was rejected by congress— someone else came up with the pyramid idea, but his committee did suggest the eye. There are suggestions the eye is a relation to the Masons, but Franklin was the only Mason on any design committee. And the use of 'the All Seeing Eye' as uniquely Masonic first appeared in 1797, 15 years after the adoption by Congress.



The Latin above the pyramid, ANNUIT COEPTIS, means "God Had Favored Our Undertaking". The Latin below, NOVUS ORDO SECLORUM, is frequently stated to mean "a new order has begun", but the governments translation of this phrase is "a new order for the ages". At the base of the pyramid is the Roman Numeral 1776.



There are 13 stars above the eagle's head, representing the 13 colonies. There are clouds surrounding the stars that some say represent any clouds of misunderstanding rolling away, but there is no documentation confirming this.

And the shield is unsupported, meaning the country could stand on its own. The shield consists of red and white stripes, with a blue bar above representing Congress. The colors are taken from the American flag and officially, the red represents hardiness and valor, the white represents purity and innocence, and the blue represents vigilance, perseverance, and justice.

The circle on the right hand side is on every National Cemetery in the United States, and a slightly modified version is the seal of the President. The bald eagle was selected as a symbol for victory for two reasons: it is not afraid of a storm, is strong, and smart enough to soar above it. And it wears no material crown, since we had broken from the tyranny of the King of England. The banner in the eagle's mouth reads E PLURIBUS UNUM, meaning "many from one".



The eagle holds arrows and an olive branch in its talons. The official meaning denote the power of peace and war. And it has been interpreted to mean that we want peace but will never be afraid to fight to preserve peace. The eagle faces the olive branch. In times of war it faces the arrows.

They say the number 13 is unlucky. This is an almost worldwide belief. But think of this: 13 original colonies; 13 signers of the Declaration of Independence; 13 stripes in our flag; 13 steps on the pyramid; 13 letters in the Latin above; 13 letters in E PLURIBUS UNUM; 13 stars above the eagle, 13 plumes of feathers on each span of its wing; 13 stripes on the shield, 13 leaves on the olive branch and 13 olives; and 13 arrows in the claw. And for minorities: the 13th Amendment.

Hey— that is thirteen 13s! I think I'll go play the Lotto.

COIN COMMANDMENTS

2. Never clean a coin
3. Handle coins by their edges
4. Store coins properly in a safe place
5. Establish a budget and buy only coins that you can afford

8. Be very careful removing coins from 2 X 2 holders to avoid scratching
9. Own and use a loupe to inspect coins under magnification
10. Always be courteous to coin dealers at their place of business.
